Please join us at **11 a.m**. on **Tuesday September 26**, (**Rain date** Thursday, **September 28**) at **Crow Farm for apple picking**. Crow Farm is located at 192 Route 6A Sandwich, MA. There are various apples available--Macouns, Cortland (limited amount), Ruby Macs, Russet and Fuji. It is always amazing how a local farmer is able to grow such great apples on Cape Cod. The pricing is \$25/peck and \$15 for a half peck. Feel free to share with a friend. Enjoy lunch on your own at several local restaurants. Suggestions are: Cafe Chew, Beth's Bakery & Cafe, Pilot House, Fishermen's View, and Marshland.

Then join on **"Rain or Shine"** on **Tuesday, October 3** for three planned events. The cost for this day is **\$18/person** and you need to **let either Nancy or Angela know that you plan to come. This is a non-refundable event**. We will leave at 12 Noon sharp! from parking lot #12 at Cape Cod Community College to travel to Dame Farm, 91B Brown Ave., Johnston, RI. The farm will have pumpkins, gourds, some apples,

winter squash and some outstanding mums. For an extra \$10 you can enjoy pumpkins and cider and a cart ride around the farm. ## **Garden Club of Hyannis Conservation Committee**

#### The Importance of Removing Invasives\*

Invasive, non-native plants are causing economic and environmental harm with 3 million acres (2010 figures) lost to invasives each year in the United States. Where do invasives come from?

- 60% come from horticulture.
- 25% come from conservation organizations. For example: Multiflora rose was used as potential cover for wildlife and given to hunters when they received a hunting license. Autmn olive was introduced as a food and habitat for wildlife.

What makes a plant invasive?

- No insects, or very few, feed on it.
- Invasives have high seed production and the seeds are easily transported.
- Invasives root quickly and send up suckers.
- Invasives have the ability to adapt to many different soils and growing conditions.
- Invasives shade out natives. No natives = no food for wildlife species.

#### What can you do as a Cape Cod gardener to help eliminate invasive plants?

Know which species are invasives and eliminate them from your property. Information can be found at this website: <a href="https://www.mass.gov/info-details/invasive-plants">https://www.mass.gov/info-details/invasive-plants</a> Invasives are continually added to this list. The latest specie to caused problems here on Cape Cod is the Grey Willow (Salix Cinerea) which is invading our coastal area.

Take care not to use colorful invasives such as Oriental Bittersweet or Rosa Multiflora in your arrangements and holiday decorations.
