#### **CONSERVATION**

### Your Fall Garden Clean Up: sustainable v. well-manicured

The Association to Preserve Cape Cod (APCC) advises the following for autumn landscape clean up:

"Leave the leaves where they fall, or at least most of them. ... Leave dead flowers standing: The seed heads provide food for birds, flowers for next year, and are important for beneficial insects that might overwinter in the stems."

In contrast, landscape companies encourage the opposite: they promote the removal of dead plant material, promising you a "well-manicured" winter yard.

The good news is that both the APCC and many landscape contractors agree that we can use fallen leaves as fertilizer for our lawn. Simply shred the leaves with a mulching lawnmower with blades designed to cut the leaves into tiny flakes. If done before the snow falls, the leaves decompose into a natural fertilizer. A mulching mower also allows grass clippings to become a natural lawn fertilizer during the summer.

#### Oval Design - container & Oasis provided by the Club

#### Make an oval, fall centerpiece for the holiday table or mantel

- $\square$  Bring approx.10-15 stems of flowers, scissors for cutting florals & paper bag for trash
- □ Bring some foliage from your garden for 'greening out bottom of design.' I often cut from my garden: Boxwood, Ninebark or Pieris japonica (Japanese Andromeda). Use what you grow Lemon cypress, Magnolia, Antiqued hydrangea (fall colors) & 'Golden Globe' Arborvitae will work too. Please leave Oriental bittersweet in the woods an invasive species in eastern N. America.
- ☐ The Club will provide oval container and floral foam, Oasis
- ☐ Symmetrical or Asymmetrical your choice! A **design has symmetry** if you can move the entire design by rotation or reflection, and the design appears unchanged.
- ☐ Bring a 'lazy susan', if you have one ... for turning your floral design
- □ 9:00 arrival/set-up; 9:30 workshop begins; share/discuss at 10:20

- > Fall fruits: trees & shrubs begin to reveal bright berries that add color & texture to arrangements. You might tuck **Viburnum opulus** berries in a design for a touch of red.
- > When florals and foliage combine, they become a dynamic duo. The best part is you can step into your yard for materials and inspiration.
- > Consider swapping traditional greenery for branches of colorful red and orange leaves, berries, or add pine cones, gourds and dried grasses if going for something more rustic.
