CONSERVATION- Marsha Rehkamp and Susan Robb

Water is one of the largest attractions and biggest problems on Cape Cod. Nitrogen, much of it from sceptic systems, is polluting our waterways. But, there are things that we as individuals can do to help conserve the quantity and improve the quality of our single source aquifer:

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Don't dump hazardous substances down the drain. Household chemicals, paints, thinners, solvents, pharmaceuticals, and other hazardous materials can leach into groundwater and drinking water supplies. Properly dispose of hazardous waste during

designated collection days at local transfer stations.

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Work to achieve zero stormwater runoff from your property. Direct roof runoff from downspouts away from paved areas. Install rain gardens to capture stormwater, and rain barrels to collect water. Maximize permeable areas and native plantings that help absorb stormwater and prevent water runoff to roads.

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Eliminate the use of fertilizers and pesticides. Reduce, or better yet, eliminate turf grass lawns.

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Conserve water usage inside and outside your house or business. For example, avoid watering the lawn during summertime drought conditions. Plant drought tolerant native species and reduce your need for irrigation.

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If using a private well, conduct regular testing, including testing for contaminants of emerging concern that are more likely to occur in the region.

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Maintain your on-site septic system properly by having it pumped regularly—every three years is recommended. Consider an advanced wastewater treatment system to treat nutrients.

HORTICULTURE - Barbara Davidson and Marsha Rehkamp

As the cold winter sets in one of my favorite things to do while sitting at the kitchen table with a hot cup of tea is to flip through the new seed catalogs and to dream of all the new plants that I can add to my Spring garden. There are a number of great seed catalogs and information on planting seeds that you can learn. I have included some of my favorite seed catalogs and where to get information on planting and caring for seeds. One advantage of joining the garden club is all the interesting things you can learn. I joined the horticulture committee and was assigned seeds to gather information on and would like to share what I learned with my fellow garden club members.

Most of the seed catalogues are not out yet. I did get one but most are now online. I will start with native seed catalogs. Here are two great resources of native seeds. With the National Wildlife Plant Finder (www.nwf.org) you can type in your zip code and get native plant recommendations. Most of the plants have photos that pop up. Results are ranked by the number of butterfly and moth species as a host plant for caterpillars. Other resources are available from regional or state specific organizations. For example, Massachusetts has the Massachusetts Native Plant Society's Calascape (https/calascape[.org/).

There are other resources for native plants such as Seed Libraries. (www.community seednetwork.org) The seed network site makes available for free all sorts of information about seed saving and establishing community seed programs for seed saving and sharing with the community. Here are some other seed catalogues available online that are recommended. 1.Guerneys 2. Johnny's seed catalogue 3. Park Seed 4. Heirloom Seeds 5. Eden Brothers 6. Etsy (on this site you have to deal with individuals).

There are several YouTube videos on planting seeds. These ones seem helpful 1. Seed starting 101 2. The complete guide to start a container garden from seed 3. Sowing seeds how to start vegetable seeds.

There are some things to look at when buying seeds 1. Make sure the retailer is selling seeds that were packaged in the same year as fresh seed has a higher rate of germination. Seeds can be stored for one year without detriment to germination rate. Older seeds have decreased germination rate, although some seeds such as beans can be stored for up to ten years. 2. Delivery time is important 3. Return polices 3. Customer service options

Native seeds and plants have become popular, but many find that growing these natives from seed is difficult. Following some basic rules in planting these seeds are necessary. There are some differences in growing native seeds (natives need cold storage and moisture before planting so fall planting makes more sense rather than spring) Also depth and timing of planting as planting too shallow the plant will dry out. Plant too deep and it won't germinate. The general rule in planting seeds is to plant at a depth that is twice their diameter. exp. one half inch wide seed is planted at one inch depth. Follow the directions on the packet for recommended spacing.
