Conservation Tip for January – Nancy Beless

Disposal of textiles - What to do with textiles no longer useful? MA residents throw 250,000 tons of textiles into trash each year. Much of these can be recycled into other products. So, what is considered a textile? In November 2022 MA banned textiles from disposal in landfill trash. Textiles are considered clothing, footwear, bedding, small rugs, bags, backpacks, curtains, fabric, stuffed animals etc. that are clean and dry. They can be worn, ripped, stained, and still be donated. Where to recycle textiles? Textiles can be donated to thrift shops, nonprofit collection bins at local landfills, such as Goodwill and Salvation Army or at for profit recycle collection bins. What happens to textiles? Many are sold for reuse or recycled into other products. For example, cotton is one of the easiest fabrics to make into recycled garments. Patagonia is one company using recycled polyester rather than virgin polyester to make many products. Look at labeling to see if made from recycled textiles. If textiles are thrown in trash, it can take 20 to 200 years for the materials to decompose and it generates greenhouse methane gas and dyes can leach into groundwater (aguifers on Cape Cod) and soil. Polyester, spandex and nylon are 3 fabrics that take a long time to decompose. Where to find recycling bins in Barnstable and Yarmouth? Bay State Textiles partners with towns to place bins in sites across MA. This is a for profit company which provides jobs and recycles textiles for various products. Barnstable: Collection bins are found at all Barnstable Schools Yarmouth: Collection bins are found at 210 Station Ave (High School), S.Y: 276 Station Ave(Station Ave School), S.Y.: 606 Forest Road, W.Y: and 400 Higgins Crowell, W.Y.

- Committee will supply <u>fresh</u> aspidistra, sago palm, tepee palm & lily grass
- Will not make completed designs/arrangements, but will practice several techniques for future designs
- Regarding Showcase rooms this workshop will provide ideas for giving your floral designs the 'pop' to make them outstanding!

Please bring:

- couple pieces of dried foliage to paint (ex. Sago palm, magnolia leaves)
- small bottle of a bright color, craft paint & brush
- tool bag: scissors, wire, wire cutters, bind wire, few paper towels & bag for discards
- few clear bottles to stage/display finished pieces (same bottles used for staging hort)
